# INTRODUCTION

Vermont has 247 incorporated municipalities, 30 villages which are considered to be municipalities, and 9 unincorporated towns and gores.

- The unincorporated towns and gores are Averill, Avery's Gore, Ferdinand, Lewis, Warner's Grant, Warren's Gore, Buel's Gore, Glastenbury, and Somerset. The first six (6) in this list are in the Northeast corner of Vermont and are known as the unified towns and gores of Essex County. Glastenbury and Somerset are towns in Southern Vermont that were unincorporated in 1937. None of the unincorporated towns and gores has a fire department.
- At one time in Vermont's history, there were 70 incorporated villages<sup>1</sup> but there are only 30 today. The current villages with the creation dates in parenthesis are: Albany village (1915), Alburg Village (1916), Barton Village (1875), Bellows Falls (1834), Cambridge Village (1908), Derby Center (1898), Derby Line (1898), Enosburg Falls (1887), Hyde Park Village (1895), Jacksonville (1905), Jeffersonville (1897), Jericho Village (1935), Johnson Village (1894), Ludlow Village (1900), Manchester Village (1900), Marshfield Village (1911), Morrisville (1890), Newbury Village (1905), Newfane Village (1907), North Bennington (1866), North Troy (1877), Old Bennington (1900), Orleans Village (1879), Poultney Village (1908), Saxton's River (1905), Swanton Village (1889), Wells River (1888), West Burke (1902), Westminster Village (1907), and Woodstock Village (1836). Some of the villages have their own fire department and those will be shown in the tables categorizing the fire departments.

Many villages merged with their respective towns or became cities. A few dissolved.

- The village of Rutland (1847) became Rutland City in 1892.
- The village of Montpelier (1818) along with the town of Montpelier became the city of Montpelier in 1895.
- The village of Barre (1886) was dissolved and all assets transferred to Barre City and the village of St. Albans (1859) become the City of St. Albans in 1902.
- The villages of Newport (1864) and West Derby (1894) merged to become Newport City in 1917.
- The village of Winooski (1866) separated from the town of Colchester in 1922 and became the city of Winooski.
- The village of Brattleboro (1832) was incorporated into the town in 1927.
- The village of Newport Center (1908) consolidated with the town of Newport in 1931.
- The village of Springfield (1866) was disincorporated and its assets transferred to the town in 1947.
- The village of Lyndon became Lyndon Fire District No. 1 but I don't know what became of it.
- The village of Fair Haven (1865) was dissolved with assets transferred to the town in 1955.
- The village of Wilmington (1855) merged with the town of Wilmington in 1959.
- The village of St. Johnsbury (1853) merged with the town of St. Johnsbury and the village of Groton (1907) merged with the town of Groton in 1965.
- The village of Proctor (1884) merged with the town of Proctor and the village of Middlebury (1816) merged with the town of Middlebury in 1966.
- The village of Chester (1906) merged with the town of Chester and the village of Windsor (1884) merged with the town of Windsor in 1967.
- The village of Bennington (1849) and the town of Bennington merged and the village of Concord disincorporated with the assets transferred to the town of Concord in 1969.
- The villages of Glover (1905) and West Glover (1911) merged with the town of Glover in 1973.
- The village of Randolph (1876) and the town of Randolph consolidated in 1984.

- The village of Plainfield (1867) merged with the town of Plainfield in 1985.
- The village of Proctorsville (1907) merged with the town of Cavendish and the village of Readsboro (1892) merged with the town of Readsboro in 1986.
- The village of Hardwick (1890) merged with the town of Hardwick and the village of Pittsford (1913) merged with the town of Pittsford in 1988.
- The village of Richmond (1902) merged with the town of Richmond in 1989.
- The village of Bristol (1903) merged with the town of Bristol in 1995.
- The village of Stowe (1895) merged with the town of Stowe in 1996.
- The village of Richford (1878) merged with the town of Richford in 1998.
- The village of Milton (1905) merged with the town of Milton in 2003.
- The village of Bradford (1891) merged with the town of Bradford in 2004.
- The village of North Westminster (1925) merged with the town of Westminster and Cabot Village (1866) merged with the town of Cabot in 2010.
- The village of Northfield (1855) merged with the town of Northfield in 2014.
- The village of Lyndonville (1890) merged with the town of Lyndon in 2017.
- The village of Waterbury (1882) merged with the town of Waterbury in 2018.
- The village of Perkinsville (1928) was dissolved and the assets transferred to the town of Weathersfield in 2020.
- The village of Essex Junction (1892) separated from the town of Essex and became the city of Essex Junction in 2022.

Municipalities utilize different types of fire departments: career, call, volunteer, and combination departments. Career fire departments employ their personnel on a full-time basis and receive regular compensation. Call fire departments receive nominal benefits and are paid when called out. Volunteer fire departments receive no compensation. A combination department usually has a limited number of personnel who are paid on a full-time basis that is augmented with a call force. Generally, career departments will be more expensive than combination departments, which will be more expensive than call departments, which will be more expensive than volunteer departments. Career departments are also known as full-time departments. Some fire departments are full-time by day but call by night and/or on weekends.

There are almost 29,452 fire departments in the United States of which only about 18% are full-time departments<sup>2</sup> but protect 2/3rds of the population. Just under half these fire departments also provide a basic level EMS service. There is a total of 223 local fire departments in Vermont of which nine (9) are considered full-time departments. Of the nine full-time departments, only one fire department is a true full-time department in that it uses full-time personnel exclusively. The other “full-time” fire departments are combination departments. There are two other fire departments that provide immediate coverage during the day with nights and weekends being on-call.

As you can deduce, the majority of the fire departments in Vermont are volunteer firefighters. This means they do not fight fires for a paycheck but do so to give back to their community. The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) estimates that volunteer fire departments save taxpayers almost \$140 billion per year in firefighting costs.

NFPA estimates that 65% of firefighters in the United States are volunteers but that number is declining from 8 per thousand people protected to just under 6 per thousand people protected<sup>3</sup>. FEMA estimates that there has been over a 20% decline of volunteer firefighters over the last few years. Another concern is that over half the volunteer firefighters are over 50 years old. Why the decline? The more common reasons given are:

1. Companies no longer allow employees to leave work to respond to an emergency call.

2. Younger people are moving to places where there are jobs and/or a lower cost of living.
3. The number of hours to train is significant and has become more intense, time which people may no longer have if they are raising a family.

### **Municipal Fire Departments**

A municipal fire department is part of a city or town funded by the city's or town's general fund budget which is paid for primarily through property taxes. The career departments listed in the first table are all municipal departments.

- Bennington, Essex, Rockingham, and Troy each have a municipal fire department and a village fire department.
- The Walden Fire Department became a municipal fire department in 1971.
- The Norwich fire department moved from being part of a fire district to being a town department in 1989.
- North Pownal, Pownal Center, and East Pownal Fire departments merged into the Pownal Valley Fire Department in 1994.
- Middlebury and East Middlebury fire departments merged in 1997.
- West Rutland Fire District merged with the town of West Rutland in 1999 to become a municipal department.
- The Milton village fire department merged with the town of Milton forming the Milton fire department.
- The Putney fire department became a municipal department in 2001.
- Berlin Fire District merged with the Montpelier Fire Department in 2002.
- The Pomfret VFD (covering North Pomfret) and the Teago fire department (covering South Pomfret) merged into the Pomfret-Teago VFD in 2012. Though independent from the town, the town partially funds the fire department.
- Barton and Orleans fire departments merged into Orleans Fire Department in 2018.
- Corinth and East Corinth Fire Departments have merged into the Corinth Fire Department in 2018.
- Colchester contracts for fire services from the private, non-profit Colchester Center Volunteer Fire Department (established in 1951) which is part of Colchester Fire District #3 and from Mallets Bay Fire Department (established in 1952) which is part of Colchester Fire District #2. In July 2020, the two fire departments merged to become the municipal Colchester Fire Department.
- Ryegate fire department became a municipal fire department in 2023.

### **Fire Districts**

A fire district is a quasi-municipal corporation. It is an independent governmental entity that exists separately from the municipality in which it resides. They are usually created for specific purposes such as fire, water, lighting, sewer, etc. As such, they have their own taxing authority. Usually, district taxes are included in the property tax bill put out by the municipality and the municipality passes the district taxes on to the district. However, some districts have their own tax collector and those district residents receive two property tax bills, one from the town and one from the district.

Vermont has many fire districts but the majority of fire districts exist to provide water and/or sewer not fire services. Nine towns have fire services provided by one or more fire districts while one town has multiple fire departments with at least one fire department part of a fire district.

- Bennington has three fire departments but only Bennington rural (Catamount Hose Company established in 1953) is part of a fire district

Towns with a single fire district providing fire services to the entire town are Brandon, Chelsea, Danville, Royalton, Westminster, and Williamstown.

- The Brandon fire district #1 provides fire (Dunmore Hose Company) and water services to the town.
- The Chelsea fire district #1 provides fire protection to the town.
- The Danville Fire District #1 provides fire and water services to the town.
- The Royalton fire district oversees the South Royalton Rescue Squad, the South Royalton Fire Department, and water services to the district.
- Westminster Fire District #3 provides fire services to the town of Westminster.
- The Williamstown fire district #1 provides fire services to the town.

Towns with multiple fire districts providing fire services to the town are Dorset, Wallingford, and Weathersfield

- Dorset has two fire districts: Dorset and East Dorset fire districts.
- Wallingford has two fire districts: Wallingford fire district #1 (established in 1907) and Wallingford fire district #2 which funds the East Wallingford fire department.
- Weathersfield has two fire districts: Ascutney and West Weathersfield. A fire study suggested that the two departments should be merged into a single municipal department but residents voted it down in 2019.

Barre has multiple fire districts which supplied water to the town. Only the Graniteville Fire District remains today as the East Barre Fire district merged with the town in 2003 and the Websterville Fire district merged with the town in 2018.

### **Private Fire Departments**

Several towns do not have a municipal fire department or fire districts. Instead, they get fire services from a private fire department. Addison, Alburgh, Bakersfield, Barton, Berlin, Charleston, Clarendon, Castleton, East Montpelier, Franklin, Glover, Grand Isle, Granville, Guilford, Highgate, Johnson, Ludlow, North Hero, Readsboro, Sheldon, Strafford, Thetford, Tinmouth, Underhill-Jericho, Vershire, Wells, Williston, and Wilmington all use a private, non-profit fire department. Barnard, Burke, Cavendish, Dover, Fairfield, Hyde Park, Londonderry, Lunenburg, Newbury, Newfane, Pomfret, Pownal, Randolph, and Woodstock have multiple private volunteer fire departments, each in a geographic fire district not a taxing fire district. Each has their own fire chief and each receives funding from their town.

For a list of the fire departments described above and when they were established, please refer to Appendix D.

### **National Standards**

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) developed a standard, known as NFPA 1710, to guide full-time fire departments on the minimum number of personnel needed for safe and effective firefighting. To provide EMS care (including transport), the State of Vermont and NFPA 1710 requires at a minimum 2 personnel. With the majority of the call volume increasingly becoming EMS related, I choose two (2) in-house EMTs and/or firefighters to be the minimum staffing level as the requirement for a fire department to be deemed capable of providing immediate coverage.

Two represents the minimum number of personnel to respond to an EMS call not to a structure fire. The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) 29 CFR 1910.134(g)(4) defines a "2-in/2-out" rule for fighting interior structure fires. Responding to a structure fire with less than four firefighters prevents the first responding unit from complying with OSHA's "2-in/2-out" standard, and places the lives of those firefighters in jeopardy. Whether the towns listed in this document comply with this regulation is not known nor is that the purpose of this document.

The coverage information is provided in four tables. The first table lists those fire departments that provide immediate coverage 24/7. The second table lists those fire departments that provide immediate coverage for some portion of the day. All provide immediate coverage during the weekday because of the difficulty getting call firefighters to respond during the day. The coverage end time varies anywhere from 5PM to 10PM. Each table lists the town, its last known population and coverage area for land (excludes water), the PSAP center for fire and EMS, the local dispatch center, staffing information, and call volume.

The third table lists those fire departments that provide 24/7 coverage but it is not immediate coverage as there is no staff in-house when the call first comes in. In other words, it lists the call and volunteer fire departments. The majority of the fire departments in Vermont are call and volunteer departments. NFPA 1720 guides volunteer fire departments on the minimum number of personnel needed for safe and effective firefighting. While this document will not provide staffing information for the call/volunteer departments, it should be noted that the number of people able to participate as firefighters has dropped significantly in many towns for several reasons: time demands, increased training requirements, increase in call volume requiring more time commitments, changes in sociological conditions, fire leadership problems, and increasing use of combination departments<sup>4</sup>. As a result, many volunteer or on-call fire departments are starting to hire two daytime firefighters as this is considered to be the time period of greatest need though this does not appear to be happening yet in Vermont. However, to handle the increase in paperwork and inspections, some towns started to hire a full-time chief such as Wilmington and Norwich. Several departments in Vermont cannot provide adequate coverage during the day so they have automatic aid agreements where both departments respond (i.e., Hyde Park and Morrisville, Elmore and Wolcott).

The fourth table lists those towns with no fire department and shows who they contract out for fire and ambulance service.

### **Fire Budgets**

Municipalities are free to use any format for internal financial reporting such as for budgeting or cost accounting. For example, some municipalities roll up health insurance, dental insurance, life insurance, disability insurance, workers comp, and unemployment insurance into the employee benefits section and Property & liability insurance into the insurance section of the general government account. Other municipalities budget this in the fire department account. Legal fees appear to be rolled up into the legal account for all municipalities; and building maintenance is in the general government account while covered by the fire department in others.

- The University of Vermont pays a fixed fee for fire services to the city of Burlington which is accounted for as fire department revenue.
- Calais contracts for fire coverage from East Montpelier paying 25% of the East Montpelier Fire Department budget and from Woodbury paying 33% of the average Woodbury Fire Department operating costs of the prior three years.
- Panton contracts for fire coverage from Vergennes for a fixed price per year plus an hourly wage to each member of the Vergennes fire department that responds to the fire call.
- St George contracts for fire coverage from Hinesburg and pays 15% of the Hinesburg Fire Department budget.
- The North Hyde Park fire department costs are split 50-50 between the towns of Eden and Hyde Park.
- The Sheffield-Wheelock fire district budget is shared by the two towns via an intergovernmental agreement with each paying 50% of the operating and capital budgets.
- Elmore and Wolcott respond to each other's calls

Full-cost budgeting has all costs allocated to each department so it is clear what it costs to run that department. As such, a full-cost budget for the fire department has wages, benefits, insurance, legal fees, utilities, fuel, equipment repairs, mechanic, and hydrant rentals (if appropriate) in its departmental operating budget. I am keeping capital

budget (including debt service) separate since most towns do capital outlays as warrant articles. Of the full-time fire departments, the only ones that do full-cost budgeting appear to be Hartford, Montpelier, St. Albans, and South Burlington with the exception that all roll up legal fees into the general government budget.

One possible way to assess a fire department is by determining the cost to protect all property in the municipality it serves. This includes not just taxable properties but all properties.

### **Ambulance Service**

In Vermont, EMS services are coordinated through the State's Department of Health, specifically the Office of EMS and Injury Prevention. Over a third of Vermont's ambulance services respond to less than one call a day, which makes maintaining skills difficult and requires a financial subsidy from covered communities (Vermont State Health Plan 2005 Part 4: Focus Areas).

Vermont has four levels of staffing: Emergency Care Attendant (ECA), EMT-B, EMT-I, EMT-P. For ambulance service, Vermont has three levels: BLS, ALS intermediate (ILS), and ALS paramedic. The state requires two (2) licensed personnel to be in a transporting ambulance at all times with the only requirement that one of the licensed providers be at least an EMT-B.

There are two types of emergency medical services in the EMS realm – a first responder service and an ambulance service.

- A first responder service provides emergency medical care at the scene but cannot provide emergency transport to a hospital. Given the time it may take for an ambulance to arrive on scene, first responder services are very prevalent (approximately 90) in Vermont. However, since they are not involved in emergency transport, they cannot bill patients for their services. Therefore, their town funds first responder services. First responders will be shown in the EMS agency column in the various tables.
- An ambulance service provides emergency transport to a hospital. Over a third of Vermont's ambulance services respond to less than one call a day which makes maintaining skills difficult and requires a financial subsidy from covered communities (Vermont State Health Plan 2005 Part 4: Focus Areas). Emergency ambulance transport is a billable service. Most towns contract out for emergency ambulance service although there are some towns that provide their own municipal emergency transport service. Ambulance service will be present in the Transport Agency column in the various tables.

### **Types of Ambulance**

A new ambulance will cost between \$150K and \$200K and if well maintained should be expected to get 250,000 miles without major work. There are basically three types of ambulance:

- Type I ambulances have a square compartment which houses a patient and a cab which contains the driver. The connection between the cab and the patient compartment is a small pass-through window.
- Type II ambulances is a van-like ambulance which makes it easier to maneuver when an area has narrow streets like a big city.
- Type III ambulances have a square compartment which houses a patient and a cab that is an integral part of the patient compartment. The connection between the cab and the patient compartment is usually a doorway.

### **Types of Ambulance Services**

There are basically four types of ambulance service. Appendix F shows the ambulance service providers and the towns they serve.

#### **I. Municipal ambulance service**

This is a publicly funded ambulance service operated by a town department. There are two types: one operated by the fire department and an ambulance department totally separate from the fire department.

When a town has a municipal ambulance service that is separate from the fire department, the fire department may still provide a first responder service. While the town collects fees for the ambulance service, the fire department is not able to collect any monies. This is fine if the fire and ambulance services are both municipal departments because the receipts go into the general fund. But in towns with fire districts, none of the fire departments in the fire districts are able to collect any fees for the first responder service they provide. But the first responder service provided is very important as treatment is started before the ambulance arrives and the firefighters assist the ambulance service personnel.

### **Fire Department ambulance service**

Most towns with full-time fire departments have an ambulance service provided by the fire department or have a municipal ambulance service.

For the majority of the fire departments, the ambulance budget does not reflect the true costs of operating the service due to its tight integration with the fire department. The patient is expected to pay when using this service and steps are taken to insure payment from the patient. For some fire departments, though, the focus is on providing the service and while the patient is billed, no attempts are made to collect.

- Calais gets ambulance service from East Montpelier and pays 30% of the ambulance budget.

### **Estimating Ambulance Service Costs**

For towns that don't break out the cost of their ambulance and fire services separately due to having cross-trained personnel, how can one estimate the cost of the ambulance service? A generally accepted costing model on how to estimate the cost of EMS services for such a fire department has the following formula:

- A. Personnel Costs = average on-call time x average hourly labor rate x average number of personnel on the call x number of incidents prior year. (Hourly rate includes benefits)
- B. Vehicle = (Operating cost per mile x annual call miles) + annual cost for ambulance replacement.
- C. Supplies = Actual Cost of Medical Supplies per year + costs of billing service.
- D. Indirect Costs = 25% (A+B+C). 25% is used as a factor to address other benefits and training costs.

Several fire departments use this formula in determining the fee to charge towns contracting for ambulance service. There is some merit to taking the formula in part A and multiplying it by the number of shifts but that is no considered part of the formula at this time.

The ambulance member fees, patient receipts, and paramedic intercepts are a significant revenue source. The fees and patient receipts are revenue deposited in either the General Fund or into a special reserve fund. Ultimately, both mechanisms are used to reduce taxes in some form. For example, ambulance fees for Manchester go into a special reserve fund, which is then used to fund the ambulance/EMS budget for the following year.

## **2. Volunteer ambulance service**

A volunteer ambulance service may be community or privately owned but are usually organized as non-profit organizations. There may be some paid personnel but it is mostly a volunteer organization. They rely on patient receipts and/or contracts with the towns to pay for the service.

Vermont is different from the rest of the New England States in that most towns use a volunteer, non-profit ambulance service, although that number has decreased over the last few years.

Just as volunteer fire departments have experienced significant decreases in volunteers, volunteer ambulance services have had similar experiences. The NY Times ran an article "Sounding the Siren for Volunteer Drivers" in October 2001 indicating that the lack of volunteers is due to (1) significant training time; (2) yearly recertification; (3) fewer employers being willing to let employees leave; and (4) increases in call volume requiring more time commitments.

In the 2018 Report to The Vermont Legislature, the Emergency Medical Services Advisory Committee indicated that 8 out of 10 transfer services are having difficulty with recruitment and retention.

- In 2014, Whitingham ambulance service and Valley Rescue Squad ceased operations.
- In 2018, Berkshire 1<sup>st</sup> Response, Danville Rescue, Derby Line ambulance, and Barton Ambulance ceased operations.
- In 2019, Ludlow Ambulance Service had to request the Ludlow taxpayers for a significant subsidy to pay for the part time and full-time salaries needed because there were not enough volunteers.
- In 2024, Williamstown Ambulance ceases operations due to lack of staffing.
- Several years ago, the Brighton Rescue Squad disbanded and the Montgomery Rescue Squad could no longer provide adequate response so Montgomery is now contracting with Enosburg Ambulance to provide emergency ambulance transport to its residents.

### 3. Hospital-based ambulance service

There are no hospital-based emergency ambulance services in Vermont.

### 4. Private ambulance service

A private ambulance service is usually a for-profit company with paid employees that contract with various towns to provide emergency and/or non-emergency services. They rely on patient receipts and the town contracts to pay for the service.

There are 80 ambulance transporting agencies but not all provide emergency transport service. The following table summarizes the number of emergency ambulance providers by category and the number of towns covered. Vermont has a total of 247 municipalities and the total covered shows 267. This is due to several towns covered by multiple transport agencies. The third column in the table shows the number of emergency ambulance transport providers in Vermont and what percentage of providers are in each category.

The last column in the above table shows what percentage of towns is serviced by emergency ambulance transport providers in the State. So, while 54% of the ambulance transport agencies are volunteer, non-profit ambulance companies, they service 69% of the municipalities in Vermont.

Please note that the above table does not take into consideration the ambulance services providing paramedic intercepts. It only reflects those ambulance service providers with emergency ambulance transport contracts with the municipalities in Vermont.

Most ambulance services bill for services provided. Given the Medicare laws, this means that paramedic intercept services are barred from billing Medicare. To get around this, an ambulance company may bill Medicare to include the cost of the paramedic service but the payment is less than if it had billed Medicare patient directly. If the ambulance service does not bill for services then the paramedic intercept can bill Medicare directly. However, for private insurance, a bill can be submitted for both the emergency ambulance transport and the paramedic intercept.

Ambulance service providers (non-municipal) contract with municipalities in a number of ways:

1. A subscription service in which residents pay a small yearly subscription fee. If the ambulance service is needed, the insurance company is billed and the resident is not responsible for anything not paid by the insurance company. If a resident chooses not to pay the subscription fee, the resident is billed for whatever the insurance company does not cover. Some of the ambulance services offering a subscription plan are:
  - Brandon Area Rescue, Bristol Rescue, Calex Ambulance, Cambridge Rescue, Deerfield Valley Rescue, Fairfax Rescue, Enosburgh Ambulance, Essex Rescue, Glover Ambulance, Ludlow Ambulance, Lyndon Rescue, Mad River Valley Ambulance, Middlebury Regional EMS, Northshire Rescue, Rescue Inc., Richmond Rescue, Shelburne Rescue, Upper Valley Ambulance, Waterbury Ambulance.
2. Some simply take their operating costs and divide it by the total population served. Each town is then assessed a fee by multiplying their population by the cost per resident.
3. Some take their operating costs and divide it by the total number of calls. Each town is then assessed a fee by multiplying their prior year call volume by the cost per call.
4. Some do not charge towns anything at all and rely on patient fees collected from the insurance companies.

### **Fire Department Staffing Levels**

The National Institute of Standards and Technology published a report in 2010 entitled “Report on Residential Fireground Field Experiments”. This report found that a four-person crew completed all tasks on the fire ground 30% faster than a two-person crew and 25% faster than a three-person crew. Similar results were seen with laddering and ventilation. Interestingly, four person crews completed primary search and rescue operations 6% faster than three person crews but 30% faster than two person crews. Two person crews took almost a minute longer than three person crews to stretch a hose line and almost 90 seconds longer than four person crews. With this in mind, it might be interesting to see what the staffing levels are in Vermont fire departments.

The first line in the staffing levels column shows full-time and on-call. Full-time personnel are career firefighters, chief officers, and any full-time civilians (i.e., executive secretary). The initial staffing levels are shown and if there has been any change in staffing levels, it will be followed by an arrow (‘=>’) and then the new levels. The second line in the staffing levels column reflects the number of shifts using full-time personnel with the following exceptions:

- Bellows Falls has a daytime staffing of 3 when one includes the fire chief and deputy fire chief. Nights have two firefighters: one full-time and one call firefighter.
- While Montpelier has a crew of 3 per shift, it is typically augmented so there are 5 personnel on duty during the day and 4 on duty half the night as they have 2 part-time EMTs who provide 24/7 coverage.

The fourth line is the number of fire stations in the municipality or district.

Firefighters are trained for firefighting and for EMT duties. Emergency response has been consolidated into many fire departments such that the majority of the call volume for a fire department today is EMS-related not fire. In fact, over the last 20 years, the number of EMS responses has more than tripled while fires have decreased by almost 50%<sup>5</sup>. It is estimated that 64% of all fire department calls in 2020 were EMS-related<sup>6</sup>. As we have seen with the floods seen in the Caledonia and Orleans Counties in July and southern Vermont counties in April, fire departments are expected to respond to natural disasters. With the advent of 9/11, fire departments also are expected to respond to acts of terrorism. So, the role of a firefighter has changed dramatically from years ago. The fire department is also involved in fire prevention activities (such as public education and property inspections) and on-going training of its personnel.

## **Fire Department Shifts**

The third line is the shift schedule (for those departments that provide 24/7 immediate coverage). A department with three shifts typically employs a 24/48 shift. This means one day (24-hour) on followed by two days off with one Kelly day every third week. A department with four shifts typically works 42 hours per week and the work shift is employed in a variety of ways. A 24/72 shift means one day (24-hour) on followed by three days off. A 10/14 shift means two 10-hour days followed by two 14-hour nights followed by four days off. All the different shifts are depicted in Appendix A at the end of this document.

## **Call Volume**

The calls for service (CFS) came from fire and EMS narrative reports found in town reports, provided by the fire chief of the department, provided by various dispatch centers, and/or were taken from the State Fire Marshal's Annual Report which show emergency calls only so there may be differences with the call numbers in town reports as they may contain emergency and non-emergency calls. Unfortunately, the fourteenth edition of "Fire in the United States 1995-2004" by the US Fire Administration indicates that only 65% of all Vermont fire department use NFIRS (upon which VFIRS is based). The latest Vermont Fire Marshal's report indicates that this may be up to 68% today.

The calls for service are broken down into EMS and total FD calls. If EMS is provided by the fire department, then the EMS numbers will be in black. If the EMS call numbers are in green, this means it is the call volume of the EMS Agency which may or may not be the transport provider. If an agency covers multiple towns, then I try to show the EMS call data of that town only. If the EMS agency contains the name of the town, then the call data represents the total calls including those of the towns it covers. If I show "No Data Avail" then I was not able to get call data for that agency.

Keep in mind that the call volume does not reflect the call response time. For example, the call volume may go down by a few calls but the call response time may actually be higher. So, call volume alone is not necessarily the only indicator of measuring the "busyness" of a fire department. Another example is the number of EMS calls. While the number of EMS calls may represent 64% of all calls, it is important to remember that an EMS call typically requires on average about 45 minutes and two or three personnel. Fire calls frequently require most, if not all, on-duty personnel and take many hours to mitigate. When looking at it from this perspective, the number of hours spent performing EMS functions versus fire functions is more like 50% each. Unfortunately, in at least one municipality, the officials looked at the call percentage and concluded that if the EMS service was privatized, it would reduce workload by 62% and hence, the fire department would not need as many personnel. Therefore, it cannot be stressed enough that call volume alone is not necessarily the only indicator of measuring the "busyness" of a fire department.

A comparison of municipal call volume across the New England States can be found in Appendix B to see if there are any trends in EMS and/or fire calls across New England.

## **Fire Mutual Aid**

An issue of growing concern for some fire departments is the increase in the number of simultaneous calls. This is not an area that much attention has been paid to but it puts additional stresses on a department. When multiple simultaneous incidents or a single incident occur such that the available local fire department resources are overwhelmed, then additional help is summoned from other nearby fire departments. When fire departments help each other in this fashion, it is called Mutual Aid. In fact, a recent survey conducted for ISO<sup>7</sup> indicates that over 50% of fire departments call on mutual aid to respond to initial alarms for a structure fire due to lack of responders.

In some communities, a fire department in an adjacent municipality can provide a quicker response than the local fire department. Typically, these fire departments enter into an Automatic Mutual Aid agreement. Automatic Aid provides for a fire department in another municipality to immediately respond to reported fires because it is closer, thus providing the quickest response of manpower and equipment to incidents, and allowing more of the

municipality to remain protected at all times. In the same ISO Survey, over 60% indicated that neighboring departments responded due to Automatic Aid agreements.

Automatic Mutual Aid is set up as agreements between participating fire departments. Mutual Aid is set up as Run cards and clearly defines which fire departments are to respond to a fire when requested at different fire alarm levels.

Mutual Aid is covered under Vermont Statute 175:2981 for fire and ?? for EMS. To form a Mutual Aid District, the communities involved must petition the State Fire Marshal. There are several Mutual Aid Districts in the state. ***An attempt was made to list them in Appendix C and the towns that belong to them but the data is not complete and has not been verified so use caution with the data.*** There are communities in New Hampshire, New York, and Massachusetts that belong to various mutual aid organizations throughout the state. Besides providing mutual aid, these organizations may also be used for joint training, group purchases, coordination of equipment purchases, and dispatch.

**Fire Dispatch**

One of the keys to limiting damage caused by fire is the response time. NFPA 1710 sets a goal for all fire departments to respond to a fire within 6 minutes. Response time is defined as the time from when a 911 call is first received to the time a fire truck arrives on scene. Part of this 6-minute window is 1 minute for dispatch time. Fire and ambulance agencies are dispatched from a dispatch center. Some people believe that all 911 calls go directly to their local dispatch center rather than to a central location. Basic 911 Service is an emergency telephone system that automatically connects 911 callers to a Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP). Enhanced-911 service does the same plus shows the caller’s name, street address, and telephone number to the PSAP. This allows the PSAP to identify the caller’s location automatically if the caller is unable to communicate this information verbally to the PSAP call taker. Enhanced-911 services are provided by the Vermont Enhanced 911 Board and are funded from the Universal Service Fund. The 911 surcharge pays for 911 computers, software, maintenance, connectivity, training and other 911-specific issues.

Originally, the intention was to have 911 calls geographically dispersed, meaning that 911 calls received in Rutland and surrounding areas, would be routed to Rutland but that is no longer true today. Vermont once had 53 primary PSAPs but that has been reduced to six primary PSAPs located throughout the State: St. Albans City PD, Hartford PD, Shelburne PD, Westminster VSP, Williston VSP, and the Lamoille CSO.

In the fire tables, there is a column for PSAP which shows the PSAP for that town. All calls to 911 in Vermont are routed to the appropriate PSAP. Police and fire calls are immediately transferred to the appropriate local dispatch center. For medical emergencies, the appropriate EMS responder is called but the PSAP stays on the line providing appropriate emergency medical instructions while waiting for the responder to arrive. The following table shows which towns are associated with a given PSAP center.

In the fire tables, there is also a column for dispatch which indicates the local dispatch center for fire and EMS. Some local dispatch centers dispatch fire and EMS, some EMS only, some dispatch police and fire, and some just dispatch police. When a different dispatch center handles fire and EMS then the first line will indicate the fire dispatch and the second line the EMS dispatch. Appendix E shows the different local dispatch centers for fire and EMS.

The following table shows the total 911 calls over the last seven years. This information was taken from the yearly report to the Governor.

**Issues Facing Fire Departments**

The biggest issue appears to be the aging apparatus and facilities and the lack of equipment.

- Roughly 41% of the existing fire stations are estimated to be over 40 years old (compared with 44% nationwide), with a little over a third of the stations have no backup power (compared with 35% nationwide) and more than half are not equipped for exhaust emission control per NFPA 1500 2002 9.1.6 (compared with 56% nationwide).
- It is estimated that more than 40% of all engines in Vermont fire departments are at least 15 years old<sup>8</sup>. This is close to the national average of 9%<sup>9</sup>. The industry standard for the life span of a fire engine is 15 years followed by 5 years of reserve status. Starting in 2007, the EPA’s new emission standards go into effect to which the fire apparatus industry must comply. It is estimated that this will increase the cost of a new engine by as much as 50K. These new emission standards will significantly reduce the amounts of nitrous oxide, particulate matter, and non-methane hydrocarbon (NMHC) emissions.

- Providing firefighters with proper and up-to-date equipment such as portable radios, SCBA units, Personal Alert Safety System devices, and personal protective clothing. The protective clothing costs about \$7,700 and the SCBA units cost about \$6,300 on average.<sup>10</sup>

Many of the older fire stations were built in the town center when it was where the population center was. As the towns have built outward, fire stations are no longer centrally located. We have seen regionalization of dispatch services and to some extent, ambulance services. With the cost of new fire stations and apparatus, will regionalization of fire services be next?

### **CAVEAT EMPTOR**

The personnel and number of stations initially came from the Fire Department Census Survey found on the US Fire Administration website and were cross-referenced with information from the town web sites and/or town reports. The population numbers were taken from the US Census Bureau. The Fire and EMS calls were taken from town reports, the Vermont Fire Marshal's Annual Reports, dispatch centers, and town officials.

The information in this document came from various sources - town reports, town plans, St. Albans Police Dispatch Center, St. Johnsbury Police Dispatch Center, Shelburne Dispatch, Washington County Department of Public Safety (WCDPS), Upper Valley Regional Dispatch Center, Twin State Fire Mutual Aid Dispatch (via Grafton County Sheriff's Office Dispatch), White River Valley Ambulance Director, and town officials - and the information was verified to the extent it was possible. While I tried to be as accurate as possible, there is the possibility for errors. Hopefully, if there are any errors, someone will be kind enough to point them out to me.

## Cost To Protect Property per \$1000 Valuation

There are various statistical measures that can be used to determine the cost effectiveness of a fire department. Most center on the cost per capita which can be a misleading statistic for those communities that get a large influx of visitors on weekends or the summer. For those communities, the cost per call may be a more telling statistic. One statistical measure I like is the cost to protect all property in a town. As this table shows, there can be a significant difference between the cost per \$1000 based on taxable properties and that of all properties. However, a fire department is expected to protect all properties so the cost to protect all properties gives a more realistic picture of the true cost to protect property in a municipality.

## Appendix B - EMS and Fire Emergency Calls across New England

Using information from the State Fire Marshal Office Annual Reports for Vermont, Maine, and Massachusetts; and NFIRS for Connecticut and New Hampshire, we can look at the number of municipal fire and EMS calls to determine if any trends can be observed. Since all the data (including that in the FMO Annual Report) is taken from NFIRS, it is dependent on the number of fire departments entering their data into the system and there is not 100% compliance.

### **Fire Departments, Dispatch Services and Emergency Medical Services in Vermont**

In looking at Connecticut, Massachusetts, and New Hampshire, the percentage of fire and EMS calls relative to the total calls are similar. Of the non-fire calls, false alarms and service calls account for between 25% and 30% of the total emergency calls for the five States in the table above.

- Maine's percentage of fire and EMS calls relative to the total calls are higher than these three States. This may be partly due to the fact that slightly less than half the fire departments report incident data.
- Vermont's percentage of fire calls is higher and the percentage of EMS calls is lower relative to the total calls. The lower EMS percentage may be due to Vermont's reliance on non-profits for ambulance service (although many towns have a first responder squad) and its higher fire call percentage may be due to its small population and smaller density (population per square mile).

## Appendix C – Mutual Aid Associations

Most of the county mutual aid associations coordinate mutual aid with respect to dispatch operations and joint training. They generally do not get involved with equipment purchases.
